A dults Independent and Motivated (AIM) is small community of adults with Intellectual and/or Developmental Disabilities (IDD) who live in the Lakeway/Bee Cave area. The first AIMers joined the community 3 years ago, and since that time we have seen slow, steady growth.

As part of that growth, AIM has just launched its first Special Olympics team. Our inaugural team is a 5-on-5 basketball team which will compete at the regional Special Olympics basketball tournament in San Marcos on February 23rd and 24th.

Watching a Special Olympics full-court basketball game can be an eye-opening experience. Sometimes the disabilities of adults with IDD are what first catch people's attention. When they take to the court, however, they are athletes competing for the win. They are tough on defense, aggressive on offense, and joyful when they sink a shot.

Similarly, the story of AIMers can be an eye-opening experience. These young adults have achieved a remarkable degree of independence. They are living in a regular apartment complex, going to work, playing sports, connecting with friends,



shopping for groceries, fixing dinner. In short, they are leading typical adult lives, which is actually quite extraordinary given their disabilities.
