The Tutus and Ties Fun Run is AIM's biggest fundraiser of the year. We are thrilled to report that our community is growing rapidly, and because we don't charge a fee for our services, the success of this event will help ensure that the adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities who are part of our community continue to thrive.

The Fun Run will take place on Oct. 1st at Lakeway City Park at 9am. The emphasis is on fun and camaraderie. There is a 1.2-mile trail with 6 fun activity stations perfect for all ability levels. We also offer a self-timed 5K for those who prefer that option.

We are delighted to announce that Independent Financial is our Signature Sponsor for the 2023 Fun Run. Although that sponsorship is taken, opportunities remain for platinum, gold, and silver sponsors.

Saying Yes

Saying yes to opportunities does not require having all possible outcomes figured out beforehand. Saying yes opens gates to new possibilities, taking us down a path that we wouldn't have seen without the initial assent. Following that new path might be filled with good surprises as well as setbacks. It might not turn out like we expected, but in most cases, we can turn from that path if it no longer serves us well.

AlMers are living their best lives because their parents—and they—said yes to considering a very different adulthood than many of them imagined as they were growing up. Because of their disabilities, most of the families imagined their son or daughter needing a great deal of daily supervision throughout their lives. But because of the structure and supports that AIM provides, AlMers have more independence and a more typical adult life than their parents dared dream possible.

Because saying yes to too much too soon can be a recipe for failure, AIM requires that those exploring AIM attend at least 12 AIM socials before they can apply to join our community. This means saying yes to one thing—saying yes to exploring the possibility. This gradual getting-to-know-you phase provides, by design, a low-pressure opportunity to make connections and ask questions. Some of those who participate in the process will ultimately determine that AIM is not the right fit for them, while others will join our community. AIM considers both outcomes successful, and indeed we take pride in the fact that even those who don't join will have benefitted from the independence tips and tricks gleaned during their participation in AIM socials.

For those who do say yes at the next step—joining AIM—they do so knowing that life is not static. AIMers face the usual joys and challenges of adulthood— relishing the camaraderie of good friends and dealing with changes in jobs and health and unexpected events like Covid. The ups are happier, and the downs are more bearable because they occur in a supportive, thriving community—a community they joined by starting with a simple yes.
